A TRIP TO THE MUSEUM OF JEWISH HERITAGE, AND THE AUSCHWITZ EXHIBITION.

Trekking into lower Manhattan on a Sunday afternoon from the suburbs is not a pleasant thought: it's such a schlep!! However, when the NCFS invited the entire membership to experience a guided tour of "Not Long Ago, Not Far Away" at the Museum of Jewish Heritage on September 15th, I set aside those negative thoughts. I had heard from others who have been to the Auschwitz exhibit, that this is a must see. As a member of the society, I also thought that seeing the exhibit with a group of people, most of

whom shared the same growing-up experience as I, would yet be another fantastic reason to attend. In addition, the cost of admission, including a private tour, was extremely low, yet more comprehensive, than other survivor groups could offer.

My first vision of the Museum was overwhelming. Outside, in front of the museum, on display, before even walking in, was an authentic actual railroad car used to transport Jews to the concentration camps; the type our parents and grandparents were squeezed into that we've all heard about. I refer to is a "cattle car". I can hear my mother saying to me in her Polish accent "my father was shot jumping from the train". I didn't cry at the sight of it, I was just in awe of being able to witness that real car, and not a photo.

We were introduced to our tour guide, given instructions, and things became very interesting. I presumed museum personnel were to give us the tour. Instead, as NCFCS members, we were treated to a far better experience. Beata Schulman, Managing Director of the Auschwitz-Birkenau Foundation Committee was the individual guiding us. Beata is one of those responsible for creating this travelling exhibit, which I learned premiered in Madrid. I was impressed that Beata was our host, and she turned out to be most welcoming and friendly in addition to being 'more than knowledgeable'. Beata shared with us her family story, which led her to immerse her life into the world of the Shoah.

The tour lasted approximately 2 hours. I honestly expected this experience to be a lot like going to the Holocaust Museum in Washington, DC, but on a smaller scale. I also expected it to be extremely emotional. In many ways it was what I expected. However, I was moved in a different way than I expected. This exhibition contained a lot of information about history leading up to the holocaust. Not that other exhibits didn't have that, but this exhibit specialized in history. In trying to learn as much as I could, I didn't spend as much time crying and getting choked up. Instead, the exhibit focused on how anti-Semitism and terror kept ratcheting up between the end of World War 1 and climaxing with the horrors that we all know about between the years 1942-1945. There was a lot of information about how the Nazis thought, and how they were able to get the masses to go along with their hate. Much of the information I had heard about, but it all was dissected in more detail for this exhibit.

There was a lot of background information about the population of the countries involved: the percent of total Jews and other nationalities in each country, and the specific geography. For instance, I learned that the reason Auschwitz was chosen where it was is due to the amount of train lines merging into that town. We were shown a map of train lines in Europe. Perhaps this is a minor fact. There would have been an 'Auschwitz' somewhere else if not in that location. Growing up, these types of technical facts weren't included in my parents telling of the holocaust. So, I found myself captivated and learning in a new way. Just how many Jewish Poles were there compared to the total population? What about the Jews in Germany? In Russia? What were the German people trying to achieve? What were those in the Nazi party trying to achieve and why? This doesn't at all change the horrors of what happened to our ancestors, but it does help to understand the history from another perspective. That in turn helped me to better see and understand correlations to what's going on today in terms of anti-Semitism, hatred, prejudice, and politics of all kinds between all factions around the world.

Besides the history, there were exhibits and photos that were astonishing!! There were real concentration camp barracks, artifacts (such as real shoes and socks worn by Jews as they arrived at Auschwitz), and numerous life-like photos of what occurred. There also were organized step-by-step explanations of what transpired during the war, explanations of how people survived, what people traded with each other in the camps, how Nazis decided who would be killed, and so much more. This all gave me a more complete picture of what our families endured to survive.

In conclusion, the visit to this museum will help me point out to my children and grandchildren what to be on the lookout for moving forward, so that "Never Again" has more in-depth meaning. Of course, I already knew what "Never Again" meant, but after this tour I learned more about the symptoms that can lead to it and how important it is for all people to make sure it never happens again, to anyone.

Moreover, what I learned that Sunday in September was captivating to me, not only because it was more examination of our history that I hadn't heard before; but because I found Beata Schulman's explanations of the facts to be riveting. Her knowledge transcends what I would have learned had I visited the Museum on my own. The ride into the

city was well worth the trip!

I'm very thankful to the NCFS for organizing this trip for us. Anyone that has not been to see this exhibit GO SEE IT! There is still time. The exhibit has been extended until August 30, 2020, and then it will move to another city in the world. It's a smart idea that this is a traveling exhibition so others can learn from this exhibit too.

JEWISH CEMETERY IN TARNÓW REDEDICATED, RESTORED, AND VANDALIZED

a Jewish Heritage in Poland press release announcing the event and dated June 17. That which follows is from a later date.

The rededication of the Tarnów Jewish cemetery took place on Wednesday, June 26, 2019. Speakers included Chief Rabbi of Poland Michael Schudrich; Chief Bishop of Poland for Catholic-Jewish Dialogue Rafał Markowski; Israeli Ambassador to Poland Anna Azari; Committee for Preservation of Jewish Heritage in Tarnów Chairman Adam Bartosz; Mayor of Tarnów Roman Ciepela; Tarnów descendant Elizabeth Szancer; and Friends of Jewish Heritage in Poland President Dr. Dan Oren. Cemetery restorations reinforce historical memory by perpetuating the tangible record, not only of deaths, but of the lives of those interred in the cemetery over hundreds of years. Further, they provide existing Jewish communities in those places in Europe with a physical anchor (along with others, especially synagogues) marking their rootedness in the place in which they still live. Jews had lived in Tarnów for about 500 years prior to World War II, and, numbering about 25,000, comprised about half of the town's total population. Today there are fewer than a handful of known Jews living in the town of over 100,000 inhabitants. Its major Jewish cemetery was severely devastated by German actions

during the war, followed by vandalism and neglect after the war. Yet thousands of tombstones survived to this day.

Adam Bartosz, a Catholic Pole and retired director of the Regional Museum in Tarnów, took it upon himself to preserve the history of the Jews of Tarnów and to care for and build interest in restoring this once great cemetery. He formed an all-volunteer Committee for Preservation of Jewish Heritage in Tarnów in 1988 and has led this project for the past thirty years. Bartosz is a 2019 Irena Sendler awardee and was honored by the Taube Foundation for Jewish Life & Culture on the evening following the rededication ceremony.

In 2017, Bartosz's committee received a substantial 3:1 matching grant from the European Union to support

major restoration work at the Tarnów Jewish cemetery. That grant is providing 2.4 million złoty (over \$600,000) to match the committee's raising 800,000 złoty (about \$200,000). The seed funds were provided by individual and organizational donors including the Małopolska Polish regional government, the Polish Ministry of Culture, and the Tarnów mayor's office. A US public charity, the Friends of Jewish Heritage in Poland, actively partnered with a Tarnów Jewish descendants' group led by Dr. Jill Leibman and Elizabeth Szancer, among others, to help the local Tarnów committee raise the needed funds to qualify for the EU-sponsored

matching grant. These include significant support from Ronald Lauder, along with the kindness of Bruce and

Lori Gendelman of the Sidney Kohl Family Foundation. Donations of all sizes came in from supporters worldwide. Stated Szancer: "The successful renovation of Tarnów's historic Jewish cemetery is a testament to the cooperation and collaboration of Jew and non-Jew, just as Jews and Poles lived there side by side in the past. As a descendant of Tarnów, I was very proud to work with Adam Bartosz, his committee, and many others to support this initiative. The memorial park, which Adam Bartosz envisioned, must be a living project, one to be continued and supported, not just for us, but for future generations. It should serve as a leading example of what can be accomplished."

Restoration work on the Tarnów cemetery, done under the supervision of the Chief Rabbinate of Poland, has included rebuilding the walls of the

cemetery, installing sidewalks, cleaning away decades of brush and vegetation, restoring many toppled and eroded tombstones and a Holocaust monument, converting the former Bet Taharah (funeral preparation room) into a mini-museum, and indexing thousands of tombstones in the cemetery to preserve those records online for access in posterity. The indexing project has already led to many descendants finding physical connections to their ancestors in the cemetery.

On July 21, just weeks after the Jewish cemetery in Tarnów was rededicated, vandals spray-painted anti-Semitic graffiti on the newly repaired wall next to the entrance gate. It read: "Jews eat children. Jadowniki eats Jews." (Jadowniki is a nearby village.)

Adam Bartosz and the Committee for Preservation of Jewish Heritage in Tarnów immediately organized a clean-up on Monday morning, July 22, in order to paint over the slogans. They released a statement: "We believe that the majority of Tarnów residents, like us ... oppose all forms of hooliganism, boorishness, anti-Semitism, or any discrimination and humiliation of other people, their origin, appearance, sex, age, etc. Let us show that in our city, there is no place for this type of acts of hooliganism."

That same day, Bartosz wrote on Facebook: "It has not been a month since the official commitment to the renovation... I'm not counting on catching the perpetrator. I'm crying with shame. This act is what some people from my city did. From my homeland. This shameful act will be known around the whole world, entered from smartphones, Facebook, from the internet these images show the mentality of people of Tarnów, Poland. God, what a shame. And helplessness. I'm so tired. I think we should buy some paint and get to work. Wash away the shame that is not ours." NOSHING IN TARNOW

If you build a kosher cafe in Poland, they will come out of the woodwork, acknowledging 'some Jewish roots'. Please note that the posts on The Blogs are contributed by third parties. I met Gerald Vineberg a couple of years ago in Krakow at a Shabbat dinner. I asked him what brought him here and he responded that he is opening a kosher café in Tarnow. Tarnow? But there are no Jews in Tarnow, I responded. He smiled and said, there are, we will just have to find them. I couldn't believe my ears. It was hard enough trying to have a kosher café in Krakow where there are at least a thousand Jews living and hundreds of thousands of Jewish tourists. How was he going to create a restaurant in Tarnow where no Jews live? To answer that question, you have to know Gerald Vineberg.

A native of Montreal, though living for some years in the Far East as well as the US, Gerald spent the main part of his career taking businesses which seemed doomed to failure and resurrecting them, turning them into successful enterprises. He was always up to the challenge, especially when the odds were against him. With his cheerful and calming demeanor, and always ready with a quip or anecdote, Gerald, though in his 70s, does not stop, keeps working and keeps an

optimistic attitude to get the job done!

It is in this context that I met Gerald in his café, “The Nosh Kosher Café,” at Lwowska 2 in Tarnow. We started with a coffee, (his house coffee from Costa Rica is freshly roasted for him in Tarnow each week) and he offered me a taste of his delicious carrot cake to accompany — I couldn’t turn him down. And when he told me cinnamon buns just came out of the oven, well, it would be rude of me to say no...

While sipping my beverage, Gerry showed me around the restaurant and the “one stop shop” of all things Jewish. Prominently displayed was my book, which I wrote about my experiences as a rabbi in modern day Poland. He sells kosher wines, coffees, special teas, yahrtzeit candles, mugs, magnets, art, mezuzas from MiPolin, Judaica — all around the café walls. He also has a big freezer of Ben and Jerry’s ice cream for sale!

Gerry told me the genesis of this crazy journey; it all began with his wife Marcia (“the brains and the beauty of the operation!”). Marcia’s family goes back to Tarnow and Dąbrowa Tarnowska for generations and she always has a special place in her heart for these towns. Gerry and Marcia came to find a way to connect with Tarnow and perhaps memorialize her aunt Mina who was an artist and had a long remarkable life. Gerry thought to open a gallery and feature her art, thereby memorializing her and adding a Jewish presence once again to Tarnow.

While he was working on it and trying to figure out the details, he kept hearing that tourists would come to Tarnow more if they had an opportunity to eat kosher. At that moment, Gerry switched gears and pursued the unimaginable task of creating a successful kosher (hechsher by the chief rabbi of Poland, Rabbi Michael Schudrich) café in Tarnow, which would also feature and sell Mina Nath’s art.

Eighteen months later the café is up and running, and he takes pride in telling me that 50 percent of the clientele are local non-Jewish Poles. When the coffee is good and the cake divine (not to mention the Moroccan soup, delicious French fries, and an array of other delicacies), then locals will support the establishment and it will thrive.

But another byproduct of Gerry’s success emerged. Tarnovian Poles who come to the café

mention in passing that they have “some Jewish roots.” Slowly, Jewish Tarnovians are reappearing and are expressing interest in activities, classes, and of course yummy dinners at “The Nosh.” There is even talk of establishing a revived Jewish community in Tarnow, made up of local Tarnovians, as well as Gerry and other expats living in Tarnow and the surrounding area.

As if that wasn’t enough, Gerry, in his first year (!) expanded to a second location. A sister city, Dąbrowa Tarnowska was 80% Jewish before the war with a magnificent synagogue (built in 1863) right next to the city square. Almost completely destroyed during the Shoah, it was renovated by the city in 2008 and has returned to its former glory. In the basement of the synagogue sits Gerry at “The Nosh 2,” with soups, drinks, sandwiches, and, of course, more Ben and Jerry’s! Groups are starting to branch out to incredible sites all over Lower Poland, and Tarnow and Dąbrowa Tarnowska are two valuable additions to the itinerary. And if you can also get a kosher bagel and tuna, why not!

Gerry, at 71, has a 15-year plan (and perhaps a second one after that!). He intends on working together with Adam Bartosz and the Committee for the Protection of Jewish Heritage, supporting the cemetery project as well as continuing to build Jewish life in Tarnow. He wants to host Shabbat dinners and bring Tarnow Jews to Krakow’s JCC to experience Jewish life there. He invited me to come and give some classes to the community and I will. When Gerry calls, I will respond because I know that he means it and that he will get it done.

If you are organizing a tiyul to Poland, and are interested in expanding your horizons, make sure to give Gerry a call and book a meal or a meeting.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE MEMBERS OF THE NEW CRACOW FRIENDSHIP SOCIETY

Dear Members,

We are all aware of the rise of anti-Semitism in the United States, as well as worldwide. As members of the New Cracow Friendship Society we cannot ignore this rise in hate which goes hand in hand with the declining support for Israel's existence and an increase in racism and bigotry against all minorities.

The Founders of our Society, as survivors of the Holocaust put into our By-Laws the Missions to:

- 1. Take action to combat anti-Semitism**
- 2. Strengthen our ties with our brethren throughout the world and particularly Israel**

We, the present-day members, have not been diligent in following the intent of these two missions. We cannot sit idly by while white supremacy is on the rise.
